Volunteers will not touch any equipment used by the school and vice versa. After the session, all equipment will be quarantined and thoroughly cleaned ready for the next use The Investigating Coasts session involves a large proportion of group work. Group sizes will be kept small, and will work as 'mini bubbles' for the duration of the session. Equipment will be shared only within these mini bubbles. Covid-19

- The novel Corona virus is a potentially fatal viral illness which can be transmitted from person to person as well as to and from inanimate objects.
- The Department of Health estimates that between 25 -50% of cases are asymptomatic so individuals may be unaware that they are contagious.
- On average, it takes 5 days before people display symptoms, during which time they are contagious (presymptomatic transmission).
- The virus can survive on surfaces for several days.
- The virus spreads more easily in indoor environments.

Vulnerable groups

Vulnerable people include those women and BAME people are particularly vulnerable. Those with certain medical conditions including diabetes, heart, liver or kidney disease, those who are than the rest of the population. The over 70s are termed clinically vulnerable and the risks rise significantly in over 80s and 90s. Men are more at risk than Older people are more likely to have severe symptoms (necessitating hospital admission) and to have a significantly higher mortality rate from the virus

Groups of people at risk

Staff

- The Centre employs three full-time wardens who are fully trained, first aid at work qualified and are DBS checked.
- All Wardens are under 45 and there is a lower mortality rate for this age group compared with older individuals.

Volunteers

- The Centre has around 80 volunteers, but only around 15 are volunteering with schools during the pandemic
- The average age of our volunteers puts many at a significantly higher risk of mortality as the over 70s are termed clinically vulnerable
- The volunteer roles will be interacting with participants from 1 school bubble at a time, and working outdoors

School Bubbles

- Although generally seen to be lowest at risk, children have not, to date, been offered vaccinations against Covid-19.
- They will be travelling from different parts of the country with varying levels of infection.
- They will have varying levels of respect for the virus and social distancing measures.
- The shared facilities at the public toilets in Charmouth could be a major concern for virus transmission.
- Participants will be a range of ages, to include both students and teachers.
